All librarians know the challenge of connecting constantly with clients to retain the library service at the forefront of their thinking. We want our clients to turn to the library as the place of information, assistance and connection.

In late 2013, as we battled to get a Christmas tree made of books to stay upright, we decided the effort was worthwhile if the tree had a real purpose.

So our library Christmas tree also became the firm's Giving Tree. Staff contributed around \$125 worth of pet food and toys in support of the RSPCA, with some staff making their first visit to the library to contribute items.

Staff participation in the program is valued by the firm's leaders.

Ensuring there is a link between our event and the work of the library has inspired interesting conversations, bringing about new understandings amongst staff around what a library service can be for them.

For all these reasons, our fundraising event is now a tradition that will definitely continue.

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
