The Dr Bronwyn Halliday Learning Centre, as the suite at the Kintore Avenue end of the ground floor hub will be known, will include new technologies that will encourage, stimulate and support learning for all members of the community. Training tools and interactive components will be available to be used by children, adults and staff for ongoing professional development and training.
