Keynote speaker Siva Vaidhyanathan, Robertson Professor of Media Studies at the University of Virginia, spoke of the

human knowledge project, the 'googlization of everything' and how digitisation is rapidly changing the way we think and research. Siva noted that Google was trying solve a librarian problem – how to find information on the web! He was also keen to see sensible copyright reform which doesn't impede the global free flow of information.
